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USC Lancaster Faculty Meeting Minutes September 5, 2025

CALL TO ORDER: 12:30 PM by Elizabeth Easley

CORRECTION/APPROVAL OF MINUTES: The minutes of the April 4, 2025, faculty organization meeting were approved.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS:

Dean of the Campus – Dr. Courtney Catledge, report submitted (**Appendix 1**). Shared highlights from written report, including:

- Enrollment is stable (even compared to last year's all-time high)
- Welcome to new faculty and staff, ongoing searches including Director of Safety and Security, Simulation Coordinator Instructor, and Groundskeeper
- Welcome Week recap and campus student engagement update: 275 students have participated in at least one event on campus this semester
- Athletics update we have around 126 athletes on campus with 36 being international students. Faculty are encouraged to come out and support our athletes at home games.
- Community activities including partnership with Lancaster Promise Neighborhood and summer STEM camps over the summer and upcoming SAT/ACT workshops this fall
- Campus facilities update: Accessible entrance to the back of Hubbard is now complete, with ongoing landscaping work. Medford patio is complete. ASC's new space is in progress. Crawford Rose Garden will likely be completed in May.
- Legislative update: 2% raise was approved; there has been significant increase in cost of healthcare which this university will absorb this year. \$640,000 allocation for reoccurring and then some deferred maintenance
- Call for travel study proposals
- International mentoring program
- Upcoming events including NASC Lunch and Learn, scholarship luncheon, travel study opportunities, and Lancaster Performing Arts Series in the community
- USCL once again named #1 two-year campus in South Carolina in Niche.com rankings

Questions and/or Comments:

C. Heinemann-Priest – What is happening to the roses that will not be relocated during the Rose Garden's renovation?

C. Catledge – There will be a small window of time for whoever wants the roses to come and dig them up and take them away.

- S. Penuel Are there any plans in place to ensure that efforts to draw students on campus [in person] does not fall solely on our Student Life department?
 - D. Roberts It is on Student Success' radar and is one of my main goals to address. Part of the issue is that high school Dual Enrollment (DE) partners can influence students' decisions on modality [in-person versus online].

Discussion followed about motivations for commuting DE students, decline in evening course offerings since online became more popular, scheduling conflicts for afternoon timeslots, and whether faculty can feel secure offering face-to-face courses. The importance of offering face-to-face courses was reiterated, as was the fact that Division chairs can let in-person classes run even with lower enrollment.

- S. Sellhorst One of the reasons the new Palmetto College Chancellor was hired was their involvement with online education. Do we have any indication on if that's going to change any policies or anything coming down from the chancellor's office yet?
 - C. Catledge During my one-on-one meeting with the Chancellor, I made sure he understands who we are, and the value we bring, and the impact we have. We'll grow with you, but it doesn't need to be entirely online. If he's able to come here to meet faculty and staff later this fall, be sure to show him our campus' value

Associate Dean for Academic and Student Affairs – Dr. David Roberts report submitted (Appendix 2).

Highlights from written report, including:

- Recent promotions (adding Chris Judge's promotion, which did not make it onto the written materials)
- Reminders for faculty:
 - Send syllabi to Pam Ellis
 - Dual Enrollment students' final and numeric grades should be sent to

 - D. Roberts It could be done one of two ways either as a spring semester class or as an overload.
 - T. Mobley-Chavous It would be treated like an extra spring class, and it does not affect their summer compensation.
- S. Alhaddad [Later in meeting but directed to the Associate Dean for Academic and Student Affairs] I had a question that I forgot to ask about the summer schedule. Is the calendar set?
 - D. Roberts We have to go off Columbia, and we are waiting for the approval for our calendar.

Academic Success Center – Written Report (Appendix 3)

Campus Compiler – Shemsi Alhaddad, report submitted (Appendix 4).

Shared updates on course evaluation system change:

- USCL is switching from Class Climate to Explorance Blue for course evaluations.
 She compared the number of responses and the general responses from the Explorance Blue trial this past summer to the summer before on Class Climate and the student response rate and evaluation numbers were similar despite different questions.
- Compiler tools are being built.
- Class Climate will expire on November 30th, 2025, meaning that it will no longer be supported. Faculty need that data for tenure and promotion summaries, so please reach out to Shemsi ASAP to request your data as the process takes time.

 - T. Mobley-Chavous Yes, it is switching from Express Scripts to CVS Caremark. That does *not* mean you have to use CVS pharmacy you can use any pharmacy with similar coverage.
- D. Rowland Will the new pharmacy benefits offer the same mail services?
 - T. Mobley-Chavous I believe so. I will confirm that.
- C. Heinemann-Preist If we have questions about 401K, who do we talk to?
 - T. Mobley-Chavous You would need to speak with SC Deferred Compensation. I can get you in touch.

Legislative and Financial Updates

Earlier raises: General Base Pay Increase for Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) Employees The 2025–2026 general appropriation bill includes a 2.0% base pay increase for classified and unclassified employees in FTE positions at higher education institutions.

Implementation Guidelines:

- Employees on a pay lag must have been hired on or before June 15, 2025, to receive the general increase (GI). The increase was reflected in the July 15th paycheck.
- Employees hired on or after April 1, 2019, are on a pay lag.
- For employees paid current, the increase also appeared on the July 15th paycheck, with the pay period beginning July 1, 2025.

- For 9-month employees, the increase is effective August 16, 2025, and does not affect summer compensation limits.
 - o Paid current: increase appears August 30th
 - o On pay lag: increase appears September 15th
- Employees on approved Leave Without Pay will receive the increase upon returning to paid status.

Pay Increases for Temporary Employees - Lancaster Campus

The campus values the contributions of our temporary staff and has authorized a 2.0% pay rate increase.

- Effective July 1, 2025
- Increase was reflected in the July 31st paycheck

Insurance Premium Contributions

The University will continue to invest in employee health and wellbeing.

- Our campus contributes significantly toward health, dental, life, and long-term disability insurance for all eligible employee categories.
- For example, a 12-month employee pays \$97.68/month for employee-only coverage under the Standard Health Plan, while the campus covers the remaining \$527.10.
- While your employee contribution will remain unchanged this year, the total premium has increased.

The campus will cover these additional costs in an effort not to pass any additional costs to faculty and staff.

USCL received an additional recurring allocation for operations of \$640,000 from the SC State Legislature for FY 2025-2026. We also received a one-time appropriation of \$1,320,000 for campus facility renovations and deferred maintenance. There was no tuition increase for students for this academic year, the 7th year running.

Other items...

- We had a successful Travel Study trip this summer to Germany, Italy, and Switzerland. 13 students and 2 faculty participated. 100% of the students participating in the trip benefitted from the Study Abroad funding approved by the Commission. Having that funding available helped with recruitment and participation in the experience. Many thanks for your continued support.
- The annual Richard Gannaway Scholarship Luncheon has been scheduled for Wednesday, November 5 at noon in the Arnold Special Events Room. Invitations will be forthcoming.

Recent and Upcoming Events Overview

The ASC Studio hosted students and families as part of **New Lancer Orientation** this summer. We were pleased to welcome them to our space, introduce them to our services, and provide a venue for orientation presentations by Palmetto College and Student Life. These kinds of events help us showcase our services to new clients and highlight what makes USCL an attractive option.

We continue to grow our dedicated course support with **new supplemental instructional sessions** for students in Nursing 312 and 324. This program, developed alongside Lancaster and Columbia nursing faculty, parallels a service that has long been available to Columbia-based students, and we're excited to finally provide it for Lancaster students. The first meeting was attended by 14 students.

With the assistance of Facilities staff and the support of Dean Courtney Catledge and Business Manager Buddy Faile, **Medford Library 221** is on its way to being a versatile, modern instructional and event space. The room has been emptied, cleaned, and painted, and additional electrical outlets have been installed. New furniture and new media capabilities are on the way, and we anticipate hosting an inaugural academic support event in late September or early October.

Summary of Tutoring Data

Year-to-year trends: Summer 2025 improved on 2024 in the number of appointments (+107.7%), which puts us in a healthy position vis-à-vis yearly goals. Nonetheless, cognizant of barriers to awareness and engagement, we hope to keep increasing student use of the center in summer.

Session distribution trends: Not surprisingly, the vast majority of students this summer preferred virtual tutoring. We also hosted a large percentage of our student contacts via our first-ever summer Health Sciences Studio. We believe this kind of service is both effective and efficient, but attendance was lower than we hoped.





- New prescription benefits ID cards will be mailed to all subscribers, including Medicareeligible members, prior to December 31, 2025.
- Once received, please present your new ID card at your network pharmacy to continue filling prescriptions without interruption.

5) Open Enrollment

Open Enrollment for benefits is October 1 - 31, 2025.

Any changes you make during Open Enrollment take effect January 1, 2026. Life insurance changes are effective January 1, 2026, or when MetLife approves coverage, whichever is later.

Changes to Dental Plans may be made during this Open Enrollment.

If you are satisfied with your current coverage, you do not need to do anything during open enrollment. Your current insurance coverage will continue in 2026.

However, you must re-enroll in Medical Spending, Limited-use Medical Spending, and Dependent Care Spending accounts each year.

Highlights for 2026

- Health insurance premiums will not increase for active employees nor funded retirees.

State Agency Accountability Report

The State Agency Accountability Report is due by Sept 15. The goals for the upcoming year include many related to elevating the student experience.

Clarifications:

- Each measure must follow the SMART framework: Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant, and Timely.
 - Due to achievability, some of the target numbers are lower than our internal goals.
 - The *relevance* is connected to the PC strategic plan.
 - The timeframe is generally one fiscal year, but may be limited to the academic year or the fall semester.
- Target numbers are updated each year. Measures can be added or removed each year.
- All of the measures describe programs/activities that are robust and reliable. We expect each of these programs/activities to thrive indefinitely.
- There is a limit to how many measures we can describe each year. Some USCL programs are not currently represented. In this past year I grouped together some programs to make space for other programs. If you have a program that you believe should be reported on in the future, talk to me.

Following are some ways you can help us meet these goals.

- Students benefit from faculty expertise and scholarly activities. Expertise and scholarship are
 enhanced through the grant programs, like the RPS, as well as conference participation. In 2024
 USCL faculty disseminated their scholarship through 44 publications, 140 presentations, and 44
 creative works. They were awarded 41 grants in total and participated in 94 other scholarly
 activities such as peer-review of scholarly work and professional consultations. We appreciate
 your hard work!
- Students benefit from access to their faculty. This access is strengthened by limiting enrollments to a maximum of 40 students per class* and maintaining a course load of (approx.) 24 contact hours per academic year**.
 - *The max enrollment per class is based on our actual enrollments, excluding PEDU classes. (Highest PEDU was 60.) The highest non-PEDU enrollment last year was 37. The high-enrolled classes tend to be ones taught at high schools, not ones taught on our campus.
 - **The course load number describes the current USCL policy and not necessarily the practice. Some faculty have redefined teaching loads and others teach overloads.
- Students benefit from Student Services. These include Academic Advising, Early Alerts, Academic Coaching, Academic Success Center, Counseling Services, Student-Athlete Success, Student

- Disability Resource Center, and Testing Services. Please include this information in your syllabi and encourage your students to make use of the services.
- We'd like to increase*** the number of students who are awarded associate's degrees. We'd also like to increase the number of students who graduate with leadership distinction (GLD), the number of OSP students who are awarded an associate degree, and the number of OSP students who graduate with academic honors. Encourage your students to check their graduation eligibility. ***I'm regretting using the word "increase". I meant increasing from our minimum target, not increasing without bound. There are set numerical targets for each of these goals. The numbers are based on trends in the data.

- We track and report all GLD and travel-study courses. We appreciate all faculty who offer those courses!
- Besides athletics, we currently have five venues that showcase student achievement: visual arts exhibitions (hosted by the art faculty), theater performances (Lancaster Players), Earth Day and Emergency Preparedness poster sessions (Geology/Geography), Celebration of Lancer Excellence (multi-disciplinary; hosted by Student Success and Retention), and the Lancaster participants at Discover USC. You can support these events by attending. Encourage students to participate in cocurricular or experiential learning activities that could lead to presenting at Celebration of Lancer Excellence and/or Discover USC.

- We'd like to increase the number of students participating in grant-funded undergraduate research. Faculty and students on our campus have successfully participated in both the PURE and Magellan programs.
- We track and report the number of student events on campus (like Welcome Week), as well as
 activities that support the community (like supplies drives). These are usually hosted by Student
 Life, TRiO and Medford Library. These activities support students' sense of belonging, help them
 meet other students, etc. Please promote these activities to students. If there are requests for
 volunteers, please consider volunteering.
- USCL has several opportunities that are open to the public, such as the NASC and professional
 visual and performing art events. These events are usually advertised at the end of faculty
 meetings and/or by email. Promoting these events helps the campus.
- At least 15 USCL groups have a faculty/staff-supervised social media presence. You can support/promote these accounts by liking, following, sharing, commenting, etc. The list is at the end of this report.
- USCL has four series that connect students with local professionals: Careers in Business, Careers in Science, the NASC Lunch-and-Learn, and the annual Career Fair. Promoting and supporting these events helps us meet the statewide education goal of workforce readiness.
- This past year, 24 students participated in internships through the USCL Internship Coordinator. Promoting the internship program also supports the goal of workforce readiness and expanding our students' workforce focused credentials.
- USCL offers public training opportunities through ed2go and the iCarolina labs to increase
 workforce credentials. Promoting these programs locally helps cement our role as an
 educational hub in Lancaster, even for those who aren't seeking degrees.

Other Data

• USCL's student-to-faculty ratio increased to 20-to-1. This number is calculated as follows:

$$\frac{\text{Student FTE}}{\text{Faculty FTE}} = \frac{\text{Full time student headcount} + \frac{1}{3}*(\text{Part time student headcount})}{\text{Full time faculty headcount} + \frac{1}{3}*(\text{Part time faculty headcount})}$$

This number is publicized by the US Dept of Education and is used in promotional materials for USCL. The ratio is high (bad). For the State Agency report we chose to focus on the actual student experience (students per class) rather than the FTE-based ratio.

- Over the past three springs, the proportion of courses offered online has increased. In Spring 2025, 45% of courses were delivered fully online (compared to traditional or hybrid/blended), compared to 33% in Spring 2023.
- Over the past three springs, the proportion of online student enrollments has increased. In Spring 2025, 77% of dual enrollment student registrations were for online classes (rather than traditional or hybrid/blended), growing from 66% in Spring 2023. In Spring 2025, 48% of non-DE student registrations were for online classes, compared to 42% in Spring 2023.
- Overall success rates were roughly equal for both fully online classes and classes that had an inperson component.

PROJECT SUMMARY

Lancaster Promise Neighborhood (LPN) encompasses a continuum of programs from early childhood to career readiness, catering to residents within the attendance boundaries of **Clinton Elementary School**, **A. R. Rucker Middle School**, and **Lancaster High School**. Situated in the most economically disadvantaged area of Lancaster County, LPN aims to address the needs of this community comprehensively.

USC Lancaster is LPN's HEI partner. Through our partnership, USCL serves LPN participants through a series of strategic initiatives designed to make higher education more accessible to this population. Our shared goal is to ensure that more participants from the LPN attendance zone not only enroll in college but persist and graduate with the tools they need to thrive.

COMPLETED INITIATIVES

3rd Annual North Carolina Black College Expo

Juniors and seniors from Lancaster High School (LHS) attended this event at Johnson
 C. Smith University in Charlotte on March 20. Eddie Boykin served as lead facilitator.

Spring 2025 ACT / SAT Test Preparation Workshops

Spearheaded by Dr. Dwayne Brown and Dr. Pat Lawrence, a combined total of 59 area high school students participated in the four Spring 2025 sessions – which were held on March 22, March 29, April 5, and April 12.

Charlotte Hornets Basketball Game

 34 participants from LHS traveled to the Hornets game versus the Sacramento Kings at the Spectrum Center in Charlotte on April 4. Eddie Boykin served as lead facilitator.

Lancer Family Fun Day

Lancer Family Fun Day was held at the Lancaster County Community Center on April 21. This dynamic recruitment initiative was designed to increase the enrollment of LHS students from disadvantaged backgrounds at USCL. The event provided an engaging, family-friendly atmosphere where prospective students and their families were able to connect with faculty, staff, and current USCL students. Participants learned about academic programs, financial aid opportunities, and support services available at USCL. Its goal was to empower and inspire students to pursue higher education and see USCL as their pathway to success. Aubrey Stewart and Matt Williamson served as lead facilitators.



South Carolina College and Career Decision Day

- This event was held on May 7 and served as an opportunity for more than 1,500 high school seniors from more than 30 high schools across the state to gather in celebration of their achievements. Organized by the South Carolina Commission on Higher Education, the event applauded and recognized students who are taking charge of their futures by committing to college or university enrollment, beginning a vocational or training program, joining the military, or entering the workforce.
- 19 LPN seniors traveled to the South Carolina State House for this event. Eddie Boykin served as lead facilitator.

Upward Bound College Signing Day & Awards

- LPN participants in USCL's Upward Bound project were recognized during this event on May 9.
- Lancaster County Partners for Youth were very generous in providing funding for the awards banquet. I served as lead facilitator alongside Eddie Boykin and Matt Williamson.

2025 Upward Bound Summer Experience

- 22 LPN participants took part in this year's Summer Experience in partnership with Upward Bound. They received supplemental classroom instruction in the following: English with Dr. Pat Lawrence and Charisse Witherspoon; lab sciences with Amy Hood and Dr. Bettie Johnson; life skills with Ashley Gadson; math with Dr. Jason Holt; and Spanish with Sandra Ovalles.
- Experiential Fridays provided opportunities for college visits, community service, and educational field trips. This summer's Experiential Friday activities included the following: community service with the Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program (June 13) in Kershaw; Museum of York County (June 20 see below) in Rock Hill; entrepreneurship at the Founders FCU Headquarters (June 27); Spanish cultural immersion at La Chalupa (July 11); team building at Breakout Games (July 18) in Pineville; and a tour of UNC Charlotte and the UNC Charlotte Botanical Gardens (July 25). We concluded our summer activities with a visit to Dave & Buster's in Pineville on August 1.

Arts & Sciences Adventure Camp

- Under the direction of Dr. Dwayne Brown, the Arts & Sciences Adventure Camp was held in two sessions from June 9-26 and July 7-24. Middle school students participated in activities in applied mathematics, arts and sciences, and computer applications.

- Nine LPN participants were enrolled in Early Start, which was held July 21 August 8. These students were able to take PCAM 299 with **Dr. Scott Whaley** and UNIV 101 with **Andrea Campbell**.
- This three-week program concluded with the Early Start Celebration at Frankie's of Charlotte in Huntersville on August 8.

Andrea Campbell and Suzette Taylor served as lead facilitators.

Fall 2025 ACT / SAT Test Preparation Workshops

- These upcoming workshops are scheduled for October 18, October 25, November 1, and November 8. Each session will be held from 12:00 Noon to 4:00 p.m. in the Bradley Arts & Sciences Building.
- Instruction will include an overview of content and test formats, practice drills, and test-taking strategies and tips.

USCL Pathways to Possibilities

- Higher education is an urgent imperative for economic potential. Modeled after the University of South Carolina's "University of Possibilities," this initiative seeks to strengthen Lancaster through boosting economic potential and education for underrepresented students residing in LPN's service area. Our purpose is to promote higher education as an accessible option and provide support for those interested in a USC education to ensure they not only know how to prepare, but graduates prepared for well-paying jobs in their chosen fields. Educational activities, engaging interactions, as well as helpful information and resources will be provided for each participant. We are targeting LPN participants in the 8th grade at A. R. Rucker Middle School for a campus-wide event on a Friday in either late October or early November.
- Matt Williamson is serving as lead facilitator and will be reaching out to many of you to assist with this initiative.







EARLY ALERTS

General Early Alert Information

We know the importance of connecting with students early and often (occurring within the first six weeks) are ideal. We are requesting that faculty <u>submit an early alert</u> for any student that is not attending class, missing assignments, or who would benefit from a contact by a student success staff person. If at any point you feel a student needs additional assistance, please follow the steps below.

To submit an alert, please complete <u>this form</u>. If you have multiple alerts to submit, you can email Zoe Byrd at <u>zmbyrd@email.sc.edu</u>. In the email, please include the student's name, student ID, reason for alert, class name, and recommendation (contact professor, tutoring, withdraw from class, counseling, etc.).

If you are not sure whether to submit an alert, make sure that you have first attempted to contact the student yourself. If a professor and student have already connected and started to form a relationship, it can be more effective for the professor to share information and resources to help support the student. Additionally, the professor has the best understanding of a student's participation and standing in a course. Direct contact from the professor can be effective in avoiding miscommunication and in continuing to build professor-student relationship.

Please remember that Early Alerts are for academic concerns about a student. If you are concerned about the safety, health, or well-being for a student, please remember to submit a Care Team Referral instead. Information on Care Team Members, the referral process, and more can be found on this webpage.

Frequently Shared Information and Resources

Below are information and resources frequently shared when contacting students for alerts. Faculty may use share this information and resources before submitting an alert.

• If a professor recommends a student withdraw from a course:

- Remind student of the withdrawal date or direct to the <u>Academic Calendar</u> for important withdrawal deadlines.
- Recommend student speaks with their academic advisor and Financial Aid. Withdrawing can have academic and financial impacts, so we always want to make sure students can make an informed decision when withdrawing.
- If a student is struggling with the course material or is scoring poorly on quizzes/tests
 - Direct them to contact their professor with questions, concerns, or issues
 - o Direct them towards the Academic Success Center
 - The ASC offers in-person and virtual one-on-one appointments for specific subjects, as well as labs and studio drop-in hours. They also offer a general study strategies session.

Texting Students

We know that it is crucial for students to regularly and frequently check their USCL email for important and time-sensitive information. We also know that students often do not check that email address or miss information. Sometimes a text message can be an effective way to get a student's attention in a timely manner when they are missing assignments or an important deadline is approaching. We generally do not recommend using or sharing your personal phone number with students. Instead, you can set up a free Google Voice phone number to use for texting students. See this article by Google on how to set up Google Voice.

Keep in mind that FERPA laws also apply to text messages, so confidential information should not be shared via text and should only be shared via USC email or directly with the student. The text message wording must be generalized. Examples: "Hi John, this is Zoe from USC Lancaster, please check your USCL email for time-sensitive information regarding a course" or "Hi Jane, this is Professor Byrd, please check your USCL email before Friday at 5PM."





OPPORTUNITY SCHOLARS PROGRAM

Funding Status

Our five-year grant for the OSP project was scheduled to end on August 31. We received a one-month extension from the U. S. Department of Education through September 30, 2025. We expect to receive the Grant Award Notification (GAN) for the first year of a new five-year grant cycle in the coming days. We scored 120 out of a possible 128 points on our FY25 grant application package. The minimum score to receive funding was 113.33.



- Experiential Fridays provided opportunities for college visits, community service, and educational field trips. This summer's Experiential Friday activities included the following: community service with the Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program (June 13) in Kershaw; Museum of York County (June 20 see below) in Rock Hill; entrepreneurship at the Founders FCU Headquarters (June 27); Spanish cultural immersion at La Chalupa (July 11); team building at Breakout Games (July 18 see below) in Pineville; and a tour of UNC Charlotte and the UNC Charlotte Botanical Gardens (July 25). LEGISLATIVE UPDATES

Congressional Appropriations

Congress returned from its summer recess to resume work on September 3. At the top of their list is taking steps to ensure that federal funding continues past the end of the current fiscal year, which is September 30. To that end, the House Labor, Health and Human Services and Education (LHHS) Appropriations Subcommittee released a draft of its FY26 bill (which will fund the FY 2026-27 program year). According to information obtained by the Council for Opportunity in Education (COE), this bill proposes to maintain level funding for Federal TRiO Programs at \$1.2 billion.

My goal is to extend UNIV 101 beyond a single course, creating opportunities for students to engage in campus organizations and activities both on and off campus.

I would like to thank **Jeff Rammage**, **Asheley Schryer**, **and Bridget Plexico** for their expertise in student life, student retention, and student involvement. I also appreciate **Dr. Walt Collins** and **Dr. Todd Lekan** for their support of this initiative in former roles. Special recognition goes to **Dr. Courtney Catledge** and **Dr. David Roberts** for their continued support and active engagement in ensuring the initiative's success.

Implementation of the First-Year Experience

The initial implementation of the First-Year Experience (FYE) began in **Summer 2025** and continued into **Fall 2025**.

Summer 2025: Lancer Enhance

As the finale to New Lancer Orientation, students attended **Lancer Enhance**, a special orientation session designed to promote enhanced student engagement. Participation was limited to new students and selected current students, the Director of Student Life (**Jeff Rammage**), and the Student Life Coordinator (**Jose Guruceaga Burgos**). Students left the session feeling joyful, encouraged, and excited about the upcoming semester.

Fall 2025: My Lancer Experience

During Fall 2025, students are actively participating in My Lancer Experience, a program encouraging them to "Stay Engaged. Get Rewarded." Students earn points by:

- Attending campus events
- Participating in high-impact experiences such as:
 - Research opportunities
 - Internships
 - Leadership programs
 - Study abroad experiences

USC FACULTY SENATE MEETING

Wednesday, May 7, 2025, at 3 p.m.

Report from the President: attending a commencement, not present.

Report from the Provost: Despite challenges to higher education right now, there is much to celebrate with respect to rankings: top 10 nationally with faculty-led living-learning communities (with a new one started for our first-generation center); top graduate schools in S; #1 international MBA; more rising rankings in multiple programs. Strong applications for FA25 (60k+, 8300 deposits for fall semester freshmen – though probably melt to 7700).

Status update: new titles for professional track faculty has been going through all the processes for approvals and planning. 18-unit criteria have been submitted, 3 approved by UCTPF committee (see website). 12 have returned to unit for revision, 2 being reviewed, 1 new submission. So, ongoing work.

Question: timing for being able to transition to new rank titles?

Answer: may start the process as soon as it is approved for your unit.

Test optional admission policy report: has been in motion for years, yet COVID-19 sped that up. It's been refined since. When students apply, they select test optional or test. Admissions office has a statistically-validated admissions index that predicts first year academic success. In addition to HS GPA, index incorporates HS grades in key academic subjects that have been shown to be best predictors (English, Math, Science). All this aligns with schools' policies around the country. Holistic review done as well. If scores are provided, they look at them too. Statistics examined: cohorts 2021,22,23. More in-state students submit test scores because of Palmetto scholarships, which require them. Average 1st-year GPA of test-optional students is a little lower than those who submitted tests, yet

actual GPAs are up across categories. Same results for retention rates and number of credit hours earned.

Question: do test-optional students fall under lower socio-economic class? Answer: haven't looked at it, but probably should.

Greetings from Megan Colascione, President of USC Staff Senate:

Established in 2021, 52 elected staff senators representing 5300+ staff across system, including Palmetto College. Advisory group to the president. Main goal is retention, to be employer of choice, and to recognize staff for their efforts. Encouraging open communication, solutions, promote positive campus climate, service opportunities. They have 8 working committees similar to those for Faculty Senate. Hired a staff ombudsperson to represent staff through difficult employment issues.

Reports of Faculty Standing Committees

 Committee on Curricula and Courses – please see link below for all proposals. 52 items. Preliminary version of new form to put proposals into the system will be used this summer to get feedback. Should go live in fall.
 Goal is to make the process more efficient.

Question: proposed changes seem to be a sign of the time because they are unusual. Course descriptions were updated to avoid the words diversity, equity, and inclusion. Hope that this was done for legitimate reasons.

Answer: course titles or bulletin description – yes, those are re-written probably to try not to attract undue political attention. This committee only deals with educational appropriateness of the course proposals and not judging.

Question: From whom in the process was this initiated?

Answer: not the committee, assumed it was decision in the units. Report approved.

- Instructional Development (InDev) Committee:
- 1. Policy developed for courses not offered by an academic unit (like UNIV courses): Recommendation is to require a MOU that requires a cooperating academic unit that incorporates oversight of instructor selection, faculty appointments, and course content.
- 2. Update on new student surveys Explorance Blue: FA25 transition. Benefits are ability to use in the Enterprise system, promotion of student survey week where there is a push for student participation. The product can also be adjusted, revised. Units and faculty can add questions (like if a program needs an answer for accreditation). Faculty can observe numbers of students who are responding that week to encourage better participation.

Development of the surveys grounded in the scholarship of teaching and learning and aligned with USC priorities. Long careful process with lots of feedback. 9 core questions, then units/departments can add 3 and faculty can add 2 from a question bank. Concerns over specific questions that could introduce bias, etc.

Question: two questions (rate course, rate professor) are not based in research on teaching effectiveness. We know they are not InDev committee recommended questions (#6, #9). Concern about use in T&P decisions, about bias against pregnant faculty (new Chronicle study).

Answer: believes there will be a reevaluation of these two questions as they get data. The unit or college can decide what questions they may use in faculty evaluation – the faculty manual doesn't specify specific questions or numbers of questions.

Report of the Chair

Outgoing chair reviews his term and work of the committees. Expressed concern over attacks on higher education which have escalated. Placating outside forces is not the solution. Calls on faculty to decide what we have to defend and how to defend it to maintain mission of the institution.

Unfinished Business

UNIV 202 and 303 proposals: C&C first needs a vote whether to accept or not in current version (prior to MOU requirement). Motion passes, those 2 courses are approved as is.

New Business

 Slate to fill committee vacancies: Athletics (Connor Harrison), UCTP (Charles Bennett). These help complete vacancies.

Good of the Order

- Next Faculty Senate Meeting: Wednesday, September 10 (time TBD)
- Steering committee recommends an ad hoc committee to investigate impact of federal funding halts.

PCCFS Executive Committee

The Palmetto College Campuses Faculty Senate Executive Committee met on Friday, August 29, 2025. Key discussion points are summarized below. I am happy to elaborate or answer any questions during the September FO meeting.

- Updates from the Associate Provost Walt Collins, Executive Vice Chancellor of Academic and Student Affairs & Associate Provost
 - Faculty Welfare Report with outcomes expected after Labor Day weekend.
 - Dr. Elkins will continue her work to support leadership onboarding during her sabbatical year.
 - Palmetto College enrollment was 8,370 students for Fall and Fall II courses.
 - Dr. Craig Wilson begins as Chancellor on September 8.
- 2. Updates on USC Policies Steve Lownes, Faculty Senate Chair
 - Two new policies under review with the Office of the Provost:
 - PCACAF 1.80 Faculty Workplace Incivility
 - PCACAF 1.82 Faculty Progressive Discipline
 - These policies designed to address faculty conduct not consistent with the Faculty Manual policies and incivility concerns/resolutions.
- 3. Changes to the Faculty Manual Lisa Hammond, Associate Provost for Faculty Affairs
 - Of the five revisions sent for approval, two were approved and three were not approved.
 - The approved revisions included minor language updates but were held over until the remaining three revisions are addressed.
 - The memo from the Mary Anne Fitzpatrick (Executive Vice President for Academic Affairs & Provost) was discussed during the meeting and detailed changes will be sent to the Office of the Provost.
- 4. Standing Committee Charges for 2025-2026 were discussed and recommendations will be made to each committee during the PCCFS meeting on September 19.
- Announcements USC Union will host the Faculty Fall Social on Friday, October 24,
